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1. Zeneggen in brief

Zeneggen - the village

Zeneggen is located in the German-speaking part of the canton of Valais (Upper Valais) on a sunny vantage point above the Rhone and Visper valleys at the foot of the Moosalp, surrounded by an impressive high mountain landscape. To the north, it borders directly on the Jungfrau-Aletsch-Bietschhorn UNESCO World Heritage Site. To the south, it borders on the highest peaks of the Valais Alps.

The municipal area covers an area of just under 8 km² and stretches from the banks of the Vispa at an altitude of approx. 670 m to an altitude of 1720 m (west of the Diebja foothills). The municipality, which is a typical scattered settlement, consists of the hamlets of Alt Zeneggen, Egga, Esch, Trolera, Sisetsch, Ze Stadlu, Unner dum Biel, Widum, Wiecherried and Gstei, all of which are located high up on the mountain above the valley floor. Zeneggen's neighbouring municipalities are Visp to the north, Visperterminen to the east, Stalden to the south, Törbel to the south-west, Bürchen to the west and Raron to the north-west.


Zeneggen looks back on an impressive history dating back to the Bronze Age. The first traces of early Bronze Age settlements can be found near the hamlet of Sisetsch (1900–1600 BC), including cup stones, whose exact meaning remains a mystery to this day. In the Middle Bronze Age (around 1250 BC), there was a hilltop settlement on the Kasteltschuggen that specialised in cattle breeding. Relics such as dry stone walls and bronze objects are preserved in the Cantonal Museum in Sion. Between 450 BC and 100 AD, a Celtic settlement was established with graves rich in bronze and pottery finds.

The first written mention of Zeneggen dates back to 1150, when it concerned the purchase of water from the Jungbach stream – an issue that occupied the community for centuries. From the 16th century onwards, a mixed economy of cattle breeding, agriculture and viticulture developed. Crafts such as lime processing and blacksmithing were also important.

Zeneggen's ecclesiastical history began with the construction of the first chapel in 1608. The present parish church was built between 1877 and 1881 and has been renovated several times since then. In the 20th century, the village experienced milestones such as electrification (1927), road construction (1931–1934) and the expansion of the drinking water supply (1947–1970). Recent developments such as the construction of the new "Steinachra" residential quarter (2023–2024) underscore Zeneggen's continuous development.

This unique combination of historical depth, living tradition and modern infrastructure makes Zeneggen a special place to live and work.





Zeneggen - its people

The people of Zeneggen are known for their hospitality, their down-to-earth nature and their close connection to nature. They are proud of their traditions and history, but at the same time open to new ideas. There is a strong sense of community in Zeneggen, and the village community is actively involved in preserving its cultural heritage and supporting local initiatives. The residents are characterised by a pragmatic but warm manner that welcomes both newcomers and guests. Their hard work and connection to nature shape the character of the region.

2. The municipal administration

Zeneggen is a small village and therefore has only a small municipal administration. Nevertheless, it is always a special and important task for the municipal employees to advise and inform the population of Zeneggen to their complete satisfaction and to respond to their individual needs as best as possible. As a small municipality, the paths to the municipal council and municipal administration are very short.

The team at the municipal office is happy to serve each individual personally at the counter.

3. Citizen obligations

Moving to

Anyone taking up residence in the municipality of Zeneggen must register with the Residents' Registration Office/Municipal Administration within two weeks of arrival and present identification documents proving their place of origin and marital status. Further information can be found at the online counter at https://www.zeneggen.ch/online-schalter/einwohnerkontrolle.

Swiss citizens must provide the following documents:

- Certificate of origin or certificate of domicile
- Family register/family certificate/birth certificate
- Proof of health insurance
- Tenancy agreement
- Personal registration

The following documents are required for foreign nationals:

- Passport
- Residence/work permit (if available)
- Proof of health insurance
- Personal registration

Swiss citizens can also register online. A move can be registered via eUmzug.

When moving house

Anyone who moves house within the municipality must report the move to the Residents' Registration Office/Municipal Administration within 14 days.

Address changes must also be reported to:

- The Post Office
- VED Energiedienste AG
- Road Traffic Office (change of driving licence and vehicle registration)
- Health insurance company, bank, insurance companies, etc.

All parties concerned would be grateful if you could help prevent time-consuming and costly delays by reporting your change of address in good time.

E-moving

You can conveniently report your move online via eUmzug.

Moving away

Anyone who leaves the municipality with the intention of taking up residence elsewhere must deregister with the Residents' Registration Office/Municipal Administration before moving away or at the latest 14 days after moving away and withdraw their identity documents (certificate of origin for Swiss citizens).

Deregistration for moving abroad

- Early deregistration (approx. 3 weeks before departure)
- Foreign nationals must bring their foreigner's identity card with them

All deregistrations are accepted at the municipal office (see opening hours) or, in the case of Swiss citizens moving within Switzerland, can be carried out via eUmzug.

Identity card

Identity cards can be applied for at the municipal office.

The following documents are required:

- Passport photo (in accordance with the new criteria)
- Family register or family identity card (children under 18 years of age)
- In the case of divorce, the divorce decree regarding custody
- Children aged 7 to 17 must sign together with their legal representative.

Swiss passport

The biometric passport was introduced in 2010. It contains a chip on which your fingerprints and facial image are stored electronically. Applications for Swiss passports are made at the ID centre in Visp. No passport photo is required.

A combined application (cheaper than separate applications) can be submitted at the ID centre in Visp. No passport photo is required for this.

Provisional passport

In urgent cases, namely when

- The 10 working day period for obtaining a regular passport is no longer sufficient,
- No valid identity document can be presented (e.g. it has been lost before departure)
- A valid identity document does not meet the requirements of the destination country,

a temporary passport can be issued either at the passport office in Visp and Sion or directly at Zurich, Basel, Geneva and Lugano airports. At the same time, an application is also made for a passport that is valid for ten years. On return, the temporary passport must be returned and the definitive passport will be issued.

Cost Provisional passport CHF 100

(issued at passport control in Sion – valid for a maximum of 12 months)

Local identity card

The blue local identity card entitles the holder to purchase tickets for the Upper Valais mountain railways at the so-called local rate. The card is valid for 5 years and must be stamped each year in the municipality of residence. The local ID card can be obtained from the municipal office. A current passport photo is required for this. Children can be listed on their parents' ID card.

Costs Local resident card CHF 10

The annual renewal is free of charge.



Marriage / Marriage for all

To arrange a wedding ceremony, please call the registry office that will be conducting the ceremony to make an appointment.

The form for the application to prepare for marriage can be submitted to the registry office in Visp. Various documents must be submitted together with the application. Please check with the relevant registry office in each case.

Registered partnership for same-sex couples

Since 1 July 2022, it has been possible to convert a registered partnership into a marriage.

This conversion is not mandatory and can be done at any time.

To have this declaration certified, you must make an appointment with the registry office, which will provide you with the necessary information regarding the required documents.

Births

Home births must be reported by relatives or the midwife to the registry office of the place of birth (or in Visp) within three days. In the case of hospital births, the hospital concerned will report the birth. To do this, the hospital administration will need your family booklet/family identity card.

Foreign parents who do not have a Swiss family booklet and/or family certificate must present various documents. Please contact the registry office of the child's place of birth for more information.

Reaching AHV retirement age

People who have reached the normal retirement age are entitled to an old-age pension. For men, this is 65. The reference age for women will be gradually increased to 65 as part of the AHV21 reform. Further useful information on the reform can be found at www.ahv-iv.ch.

Entitlement to an old-age pension arises on the first day of the month following the attainment of the normal retirement age. Anyone who wishes to receive their old-age pension must register their entitlement. It is advisable to submit the application 3-4 months before reaching retirement age. Application forms are available from the compensation offices and their AHV branches or can be completed online at www.ahvwallis.ch.

Death

Once the doctor has certified the death, notify the funeral home of your choice, which will take care of the body.

If death occurs in a hospital or retirement/nursing home, the medical death certificate is forwarded directly to the registry office. If the person died at home, the relatives receive the medical death certificate from the doctor. To relieve the burden on the relatives, the funeral



director authorised by you will now report the death to the registry office. The death will be entered in the family register and a new family certificate will be issued.

The registry office of the place of death officially reports the death to the place of residence. The cantonal authorities and the AHV also receive a notification. Relatives can order death certificates for further requirements. Certificates of inheritance are issued by the municipal court.

Elections and referendums

We, the citizens, are the highest authority in our municipality. We decide on specific issues in ballot box votes and determine the political composition of our executive and which individuals will serve in it. All cantonal and Swiss citizens who are at least 18 years of age and have had a valid certificate of residence in the municipality for at least 30 days are eligible to vote in municipal matters.

Instructions for voting

The ballot boxes are open at the following times:

Municipal office (1st floor)

- Saturday, 6:00 p.m. 7:00 p.m.
- Sunday, 9:30 a.m. 10:30 a.m.

Postal voting

- Fill out the ballot papers and place them in the small voting envelopes provided.
- Place all small envelopes in the large transmission envelope.
- Sign the voting card at the bottom of the front. Without a signature, the vote is invalid.
- Place the signed voting card with the label (return slip) in the transmission envelope so that the address of the municipality appears in the window. Without the voting card (return slip), the vote is invalid.
- Seal this envelope.
- Frank the envelope and post it in good time (no later than Tuesday before the election by B Mail or Thursday by A Mail) or place it unstamped directly in the ballot box at the Zeneggen municipal administration office.

Submission at the polling station

The official voting materials delivered to your home (voting card/return slip, envelope and ballot paper) must be taken to the ballot box.



Dog ownership

If you wish to keep a dog, certain basic regulations apply in the canton of Valais. This will help to ensure that humans and animals can coexist harmoniously.

Registration

As soon as you live in Zeneggen and own a dog, you must register it with the local authority. The dog must also be microchipped and registered in the national AMICUS database.

Liability insurance and dog licence

Every dog owner must take out liability insurance.

If you live in the canton for more than three months of the year or are registered as a resident here, you are liable for dog tax. The annual dog tax in the municipality of Zeneggen is CHF 150.00 and is invoiced in May of each year, with a cut-off date of 30 April.

Leash requirement and waste disposal

Dogs must be kept on a leash in the village of Zeneggen and around schools, playgrounds and sports facilities. Outside the village, dogs must be kept under control.

Dog waste must be collected and disposed of in the designated facilities.

Training requirement for new dog owners

Anyone who keeps a dog in the canton of Valais for the first time after 1 January 2020 must complete a recognised course for dog owners.

Ban on certain dog breeds

Some dog breeds and their crossbreeds are no longer permitted in the canton of Valais. These include Pit Bull Terriers, American Staffordshire Terriers, Staffordshire Bull Terriers, Bull Terriers, Dobermans, Argentine Dogos, Fila Brasileiro, Tosas, Rottweilers, Mastiffs, Neapolitan Mastiffs and Spanish Mastiffs. The following applies to these breeds: no new acquisitions are permitted; stays are only possible to a very limited extent (e.g. holiday visits).

Responsibility and reporting obligation

Dog owners are responsible for their dogs' behaviour and liable for any damage they cause. If a dog injures a person or animal or displays conspicuous aggressive behaviour, this must be reported to the cantonal veterinary service.

Taxation and fees

The tax rate in Zeneggen is currently 1.3 points. If you have any questions about your tax return/calculation, the Finance/Tax Department will be happy to provide you with information.

The municipality also levies waste, sewage and drinking water charges. The amount of these charges is regulated in the relevant regulations.

The municipality of Zeneggen sends two reminders to defaulters before initiating debt collection proceedings. Debt collection proceedings are initiated regardless of the amount owed.



Waste

Rubbish is collected every Monday. For special waste, please refer to the information boards at the rubbish collection points. Information about separate collections will be provided in good time in the app.

Information on waste disposal can be found in <u>the municipality's waste guide</u> and on the REVO Oberwallis website (<u>REVO - waste disposal guide</u>).

Clean excavated material can be disposed of at the Geländerkehr landfill site. The landfill site is open every Wednesday between 5.30 p.m. and 6 p.m. from March to November, additionally every Saturday from 3.30 p.m. to 4 p.m. in April and May, and on the first Saturday of each month between 3.30 p.m. and 4 p.m. from June to November.

No compostable green waste is accepted, only clean construction waste.

Garden and kitchen waste up to 2 cm thick can be dropped off at the municipal depot every Monday between 4 p.m. and 4.30 p.m. in January, February and December.

Post office / ATM

There is no longer a post office or agency in Zeneggen. However, Zeneggen does have a postal home delivery service. Order the service you require using the <u>Post app</u>, online or with the order pen to your home. If you order the service before 7.30 a.m., your postman or postwoman will come by on the same day (Monday to Friday). The postman or postwoman will collect your items or any cash directly from your front door or from your letterbox. You will receive confirmation of posting for pre-franked items in "My items" or by email. Refunds and ordered goods will be delivered on the next delivery round at the latest (Monday to Friday).

There is no ATM in Zeneggen. However, in cooperation with Raiffeisen, cash can be withdrawn by card at Magusii during its opening hours.

Shopping

Magusii in Zeneggen is more than just a village shop; it is a central meeting place for the community. Since 2011, the shop has also housed a cosy bistro next to the tourist office, inviting visitors to linger. Here, visitors can not only do their daily shopping, but also enjoy the company of the villagers over a cup of coffee. The bistro also offers free internet access (Wi-Fi), making it an ideal place for work and socialising.

4. Education and training

Kindergarten and primary school

Zeneggen has a kindergarten (1H-2H), a lower school (3H-4H) and an upper school (5H-8H). It offers kindergarten teachers and pupils a family-like learning environment with small classes and individual support. Zeneggen is part of the Visp school district, which is overseen by the Intercommunal School Commission (ISK). The dedicated teaching team is made up of specialists for the various grade levels and subject areas. The school management is available to address any concerns parents and pupils may have.

Extracurricular childcare

Zeneggen does not have its own daycare centre (KITA). However, the municipality has agreements with neighbouring municipalities to offer parents the opportunity to place their children in childcare facilities there.

The "Schliifistuba" association, in cooperation with the municipality of Zeneggen, offers valuable support for the care of primary school children during lunchtime and after school. The "Schliifistuba" is located in the old vicarage, in close proximity to the school and play facilities such as the gym playing field and the playground below the church. For the 2025/2026 school year, the " " will be open on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Music contributes significantly to a child's positive development. It stimulates their intellectual, emotional and social skills and promotes structured thinking and behaviour through concentration, perseverance, coordination and motor skills.

Children and young people who play music improve their social behaviour, become more emotionally sensitive and learn solidarity and team spirit. Music helps them to find new perspectives and develop their personality.

5. Tourism, culture and sport

Facilities for leisure, sport and recreation

Zeneggen offers a wide range of local recreational opportunities for young and old. A particular attraction is the area around the **fire pond**, which has been developed into a popular meeting place. Here, visitors will find a fire pit, a fountain, a table with a sun sail, an open sandpit by the lake, a climbing frame and a boccia court.

There are also two attractive playgrounds for families with children. The **Zeneggen forest playground** offers numerous play opportunities in the midst of nature and invites visitors to explore. The **Zeneggen village playground**, idyllically located below the church, has swings, an Indian teepee playhouse with a slide, climbing elements and a trampoline embedded in the ground. Parking spaces are located near the church, and the bus stop is also easily accessible.

These facilities make Zeneggen an ideal place for those seeking relaxation and families who want to enjoy nature.

If hiking and biking are not enough for you, you can also play tennis in Zeneggen:

two clay courts, a practice wall, changing rooms with showers and its own clubhouse: the <u>Zeneggen Tennis Cooperative</u> has everything you need to chase the yellow felt ball in a dignified setting. The courts were renovated in 1996 and 2016 and are in perfect condition.



Events

Every year, Zeneggen offers a variety of events that enrich the cultural and social life of the community. The calendar of events includes regular church services, club activities and special occasions. Cultural events such as the "KulturMagusii" evenings also enrich village life with varied programmes. The calendar of events offers something for all age groups and interests.

The Moosalp Region event calendar also features numerous interesting events.

In summer, several events and activities are organised by "Zeneggu erläbe", offering visitors a different way to get to know the village and its traditions.

The Zeneggen community app also provides up-to-date information.

Addresses of the clubs

Zeneggen is characterised by a diverse and active club life, which strengthens the village community and offers numerous leisure activities. The clubs range from traditional communities such as the Augstbordgeteilschaft and the Burgerverwaltung to sports groups such as the Ski and Sports Club and the Tennis Cooperative. Those interested in music will find a home in the Tambouren- und Pfeiferverein (drum and fife club) or the church choir. For the younger generation, the youth club offers a platform for joint activities. The women's and mothers' association and the Samaritan association take on social responsibility and are committed to the well-being of the village residents. This wide range of clubs enables residents to get involved according to their interests and actively shape community life in Zeneggen.

6. Overview of the authorities

The municipal council

The Municipal Council is the executive body of the municipality of Zeneggen. It manages the day-to-day affairs of the municipality, ensures that the decisions of the municipal assembly are implemented, is responsible for finances and represents the municipality externally. It also makes strategic decisions in areas such as infrastructure, education, social affairs, the environment and the economy. The members work together in their respective departments and jointly ensure that community life is vibrant, well organised and sustainable. All members of the Municipal Council work on a part-time basis. Each member of the Municipal Council is responsible for a specific department.

Municipal council meetings are held every four weeks on Monday evenings. The deliberations are not open to the public.
